





BUILDING & HOME RENOVATIONS

You must obtain a building permit before you:

- Construct any new building over ten square meters in area or in place of another structure, such as a mobile home, on your property
- Make renovations or repairs or add to a building
- · Change the use of a building
- Excavate or construct a foundation
- · Construct a seasonal building
- Undertake work regarding the installation, alteration, extension or repair of an on-site sewage system



Please contact Building Services at 905-468-3266 ext. 256 early in the planning of a project to determine all applicable requirements.



BY-LAW

The **Municipal Act** allows municipalities to pass by-laws for the regulation of many areas affecting health, safety and the enjoyment of property. The following by-laws make up part of the Town's established list: urban tree removal; animal care and control; clean yards; property standards; private outdoor swimming pools and hot tub enclosures; noise and parking; and others as listed on the Town's website www.notl.com.

DEVELOPMENT

The responsibility for planning in Ontario is shared between the province and municipalities. The province sets the ground rules and directions for land use planning through the Planning Act and the Provincial Policy Statement (PPS). In Niagara-on-the-Lake, the provincial plans, including Greenbelt Plan, Niagara Escarpment Plan and Growth Plan for the Greater Golden Horseshoe and Niagara Regional Official Plan work together with the Provincial Policy Statement (PPS) to manage growth and to protect agricultural land and the natural environment.

The Town is responsible for implementing the province's land use planning policy framework through the Official Plan and Zoning Bylaw and to make land use planning decisions to achieve the community's economic, social and environmental objectives. Municipal decisions must be consistent with the PPS, which means that municipalities are given some flexibility in deciding how best to achieve provincial policy direction.

Citizen input on development applications is an important part of the planning process. As such, public comment is actively solicited on planning matters. Public notices and information on current application and appeals can be found on the Town's website www.notl.com or by calling 905-468-3266 ext. 315.

NOTL Fire & Emergency Services

The Niagara-on-the-Lake Fire & Emergency Services Department is a volunteer organization made up of 110 firefighters who work together to create an efficient and high-quality emergency service. With a dedication to prevention, education, and emergency response, Niagara-on-the-Lake Fire & Emergency Services' goal is to be high-performing, progressive, and visionary in the provisions of emergency services within the community.

Green Light Awareness

Life and death situations are often decided on how fast help arrives. Flashing green lights are used by volunteer firefighters who are responding to an emergency. We ask you to be courteous and yield the right of way when you see an approaching vehicle displaying a flashing green light.



Grill / BBQ Fire Safety

With barbeque season underway, we want to remind residents about the importance of barbeque safety this grilling season. Barbeques are only intended for outdoor use. If they are used in an enclosed space such as a garage, carbon monoxide can reach dangerous levels that can cause serious health risks. It is important to keep your barbeque away from combustible items such as fences, decks, and railings. Always keep them away from the side of your home and out from under eaves and overhangs. Before using your BBQ follow these simple steps to ensure you are ready for the season:

- Clean the inside of your BBQ with a wire brush, ensuring all grills and burners are free of dirt, dust, grease build-up, or other debris.
- Check all hoses and connections leading from the fuel supply (natural gas or propane). Replace any hoses or connections that are cracked or damaged.
- Test for leaks by applying a 50/50 solution of water and dish soap to all connections. If bubbles appear, tighten the connections and/or replace any damaged parts.





FIRE & EMERGENCY SERVICES



Open Air Burns & Backyard Camp Fires

In Niagara-on-the-Lake, open-air burns are only permitted for farmers to burn off their agricultural waste in rural areas of town. Residents with yard waste are encouraged to bundle their yard waste and place it at the road for disposal with their household waste and recycling free of charge. Open-air burning is not permitted in urban areas of town. Burning garbage or construction waste is not permitted at any time and is subject to cost recovery fees for a fire department response. NOTL residents who want to have a backyard fire are encouraged to purchase a listed, natural gas or propane fire pit or table as these devices do not give off the undesirable smoke and embers that a wood-burning fire pit produces.

Smoke and Carbon Monoxide alarms expire!

Most people are unaware that their smoke or carbon monoxide alarm expire. Smoke alarms expire 10 years after the date of manufacture, while most carbon monoxide alarms expire 5-7 years after the date of manufacture, depending on the brand. It is extremely important that your alarms are working properly as they are an early warning during a fire or gas emergency. Most alarms will have a date to be replaced by or a manufacture date on the alarm. Most of us know that electronic devices don't last forever. As time goes on electronic devices may become less reliable than they once were. Smoke and carbon monoxide alarms are electronic devices that operate 24 hours a day 7 days a week. They will not last forever. Check yours today! It could save your life!

- Confirm your alarm is not expired and is operational.
- Change your batteries at least annually.
- · Most hard-wired alarms, still have battery backups that need to be checked so they can continue to protect you during a power outage.
- Test your alarms monthly.
- Ensure your smoke alarms are not dirty. Alarms can be gently vacuumed to ensure they can properly sense smoke.
- Understand what the beeps or chirps mean by reading the manufacturer instructions or back of the device.







OLICENSES & PERMITS

The Town issues several licenses and permits such as:

BUILDING

o Building permits are required for most construction activities, including sheds greater than 108 square feet, swimming pools, decks greater than 24" above grade. Accurate drawings and a site plan are necessary in order that the project may be assessed for compliance with the Code and other applicable laws including zoning bylaws. Please contact Building Services at 905-468-3266 ext. 256 early in the planning of a project to determine all applicable requirements. See Building & Home Renovations (page 8) for more information.

• DOG

o By-law 4512-11 requires that all dogs 6 months of age and older be licensed annually before January 1 of each year. Licenses can be purchased starting in October. Call 905-468-3266 or visit www.notl.com/content/dog-licences for a list of fees and additional information.

EVENTS

- o A Special Event is an event which may occupy all or part of Town owned property or may result in the disruption of the local flow of traffic. A special event may be defined as, but not limited to, a parade, festival, filming, bicycle race/tour, running event, procession, walk-a-thon, and/or any other activity that may include the following component(s):
 - Street Closure(s)
 - Fireworks or pyrotechnics
 - · Live entertainment
 - Temporary Structures/ Tents
 - · Service of food or alcohol
 - Large volumes of vehicular or pedestrian traffic

GAMING

o The AGCO is responsible for regulating and overseeing licensed lottery events (such as bingo, raffles and the sale of break open tickets) conducted by eligible charitable and religious organizations to raise funds to support charitable purposes. As part of the AGCO's regulatory responsibilities in the charitable sector, the AGCO administers, in partnership with municipalities, the regulatory framework governing the issuance of charitable lottery licences. • HERITAGE

o Do I need a Heritage Permit?

A Council approved Heritage Permit is required for most alterations to Part IV and Part V heritage designated properties (designated under the **Ontario Heritage Act**). OPEN AIR BURN PERMIT

o Permission to burn outside the urban boundary is provided on an annual basis and can be processed through an online fillable form on the Town's website www.notl.com. In the event the applicant does not have access to the online form, the applicant can call the Town of Niagara-on-the-Lake Customer Service Department or Fire & Emergency Services at 905-468-3266 prior to having a controlled open-air burn. (Office Opening Times: Monday to Friday, 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.). Residential burning is not permitted.

SHORT TERM RENTAL

o All Short Term Rentals within the Town of Niagara-on-the-Lake must be licensed in order to operate. Websites, such as Airbnb, VRBO etc., are only a means to advertise. 

Things to Know when Parking

Do not stop, stand or park a vehicle:

- Facing the wrong way on the street or against the direction of traffic flow
- On the roadway side of any stopped, standing or parked vehicle (no double parking, stopping or standing)
- On or partly on or over a sidewalk
- Within an intersection or crosswalk
- On any outer boulevard

Do not park a vehicle:

- Within 10m (33ft) of an intersection
- Within 3m (10ft) on a fire hydrant
- On an inner boulevard
- In front of or within 1.5m (5ft) of a laneway or driveway or a curb-cut
- On either side of a roadway so as to obstruct a vehicle in the use of any laneway or driveway
- For the purpose of displaying such vehicle for sale or lease
- For the purpose of servicing or repairing a vehicle except for emergency
- For a period of time exceeding 12 hours

Accessible Parking:

There are several accessible parking spaces located throughout the Town of Niagara-on-the-Lake; these spaces are located both on the street and in municipal parking lots. All vehicles parking in an accessible zone must display an original and current accessible permit. Any vehicle found parked in a accessible zone without the valid accessible permit will be ticketed. The fine for parking in an accessible zone is \$400.00.

Resident Parking Permits

Purchase your "1-hour Parking Permit" for \$20 (Old Town) or \$22 (Niagara-on-the Green) at the Town of Niagara-on-the-Lake Administration Building located at 1593 Four Mile Creek Road in Virgil. Parking Permits are available for purchase starting October 1st and are exclusively for residents of the Town of Niagara-on-the-Lake. The permit entitles the permit holder up to 1 hour of free parking at any parking meter/pay & display machine in the Heritage District. Please note a valid piece of identification must be shown as proof of address in order to obtain a permit. Permits are valid for the vehicle identified, by license plate number, on the face of the permit only, and are non-transferable.

Note: Permits issued are valid from January 1 to December 31 of any given year. Residents must, therefore, purchase a new permit each year.

Parking Permits FAQ

Q: Do I need to purchase a new permit if I change my license plate?

A: You need to obtain a replacement permit for a fee of \$5.00.

Q: What if my permit starts to peel off my windshield?

A: We will print you a replacement permit free of charge if your permit is no longer adhering to the window.

Q: I had my windshield replaced, how do I get a new permit?

A: You need to obtain a replacement permit for \$5.00.

Q: I rent in NOTG, may I obtain my own permit?

A: Permits issued in NOTG are issued to the owner of the property and are limited to 1 permit per household. However, if the owner of the property chooses to give permission to their tenant to obtain the permit for their property, they may do so by contacting the Town and authorizing the tenant and identifying them by name. The tenant would then need to come in with proper photo ID and pay for the permit in order to obtain it.

Q: I own multiple vehicles, may I move the permit between vehicles?

A: No. You must purchase a permit for every vehicle you wish to park in the heritage district. The permits are issued to a vehicle and must be attached to a plate number. If you purchase one permit and move it between vehicles you will be ticketed.

Q: Do I need to attach the permit to my windshield as noted on the permit?

A: It is recommended that you properly affix the permit to your windshield. The permits are scanned by By-law Enforcement Officers and it is easier for the handheld devices to read the permit when it is right up against your windshield. If the permit cannot be read properly you could get ticketed.

WATER & WASTEWATER SERVICES

The Town of Niagara-on-the-Lake owns and operates two separate drinking water distribution systems which are the Niagara-on-the-Lake drinking water system (Niagara-on-the-Lake DWS) and the Bevan Heights drinking water system (Bevan Heights DWS). The Town maintains responsibility for water distribution only; the facilities for water treatment and storage are owned and managed by the Niagara Region. The two drinking water systems distribute treated drinking water within a service area of approximately 12,600 Ha. The service area is bounded by Lake Ontario, the Niagara River, the City of Niagara Falls and the City of St. Catharines.

SAMPLE STATIONS

Curious what those green objects are that stand alone and look like green parking meters? They are water sample stations. These stations give the Town the ability to test the quality of the water we drink. They are a direct line to the watermain. These stations allow the Town to better enhance the Town's ability to test a wider area of the Town's water supply. The Town has added seven (7) of these stations in 2020 and is looking to add three (3) in 2021. With the already fifteen (15) stations within the system, the Town has a better ability to make sure the water you drinking meets and exceeds Ministry Legislation where possible. The water system that the Town has is one of the best in the country and with the wider array of testing, we can stay on top of any issues that may arise.

WATER FACTS

The Niagara-on-the-Lake Drinking Water System includes:

- 200 km of watermains
- 1386 of fire hydrants
- 1358 valves
- 2 water filling stations

The Bevan Heights Drinking Water System includes:

- 2 km of watermains
- 16 fire hydrants
- 19 valves

Did You Know?

Niagara-on-the-Lake has received regulatory relief from Lead Testing; however, bacteriological and other chemical testing is still being conducted according to provincial legislation.

INDOOR WATER SAVING TIPS

- Keep drinking water in the fridge to avoid running the tap to get cold water
- Choose to do only full loads of laundry or use the appropriate water-saving settings for smaller loads
- Shower for no longer than 10 minutes
- Test your toilet for leaks

OUTDOOR WATER SAVING TIPS

- Water your lawn in the early morning or late evening when evaporation rates are low
- Keep your lawn about 6cm long because taller grass holds water better
- Use rain barrels to catch run-off from eaves when it rains
- Sweep, don't hose down your driveway and walkways

ARENAS





EXPERIENCE HISTORY HERE





