M DEVELOPMENT & PLANNING

What is planning?

Land use planning in Niagara-on-the-Lake plays an important role in shaping the community. The purpose of land use planning is to manage land and resources to create a safe, healthy and inviting place to live, work and play. Some of the components that planning considers are:

- How residents travel to where they need to go:
- How residents can access their homes;
- Where people can gather with family, friends and neighbours; and,
- Where houses, businesses and parks should be located to make the Town accessible.

Who sets the rules?

In Ontario, the Province, Region and local municipalities work together. The Province sets the ground rules and directions for planning, through the *Planning Act* and the Provincial Planning Statement (PPS). These rules help protect the environment and make sure the Town is growing appropriately. In Niagara-on-the-Lake, area-specific provincial plans, including the Greenbelt Plan, Niagara Escarpment Plan, and the Niagara Official Plan, work together with the PPS.

The Town is responsible for implementing the provincial and regional land use planning policy framework through the Town's Official Plan and Zoning By-law. Through Council and/or the Committee of Adjustment, the Town is also responsible for making land use planning decisions to achieve the community's economic, social, and environmental objectives. Municipal decisions on development applications must be consistent with the PPS and conform to provincial plans, allowing for municipalities to be given some flexibility in deciding how to best achieve provincial policy direction.

How can community members play a role?

Community members input on development applications is an important part of the planning process. Town Staff encourage public comment on planning matters, and all comments received are considered in the review of development applications. Community members can get involved with development applications in a few ways: through attending Open Houses to learn more about the proposal, speaking about a proposal during a Public Meeting or Committee of Adjustment Hearing. and/or providing written comments. Public notices, opportunities to provide input, and information on current development applications and appeals can be found on the Town's website at www.notl.com/business-development. Official Plan Review

The Town has developed a work plan for the completion of a new Niagara-on-the-Lake Official Plan by the end of 2025, building upon work completed in 2019, while addressing changes in provincial planning legislation, such as the new Provincial Planning Statement and recently approved Niagara Official Plan. Public open houses will provide the opportunity for the public to learn about the Official Plan and seek input on the review. An updated draft Official Plan is targeted for mid-year, with the goal to adopt the Official Plan by the end of 2025.



FIRE & EMERGENCY SERVICES

The Niagara-on-the-Lake Fire & Emergency Services Department is a volunteer organization made up of 100 firefighters who work together to create an efficient and high-quality emergency service. With a dedication to prevention, education, and emergency response, Niagara-on-the-Lake Fire & Emergency Services' goal is to be high-performing, progressive, and visionary in the provision of emergency services within the community.



GREEN LIGHT AWARENESS

Beautiful sunny weather brings busy summer streets, making it very important to keep an eye out for the green light when driving in Niagara-on-the-Lake. When volunteer firefighters respond to an emergency, they first drive their personal vehicles to their respective fire stations before they can respond to the emergency in the fire trucks that we're all familiar with. A green light may appear in any type of vehicle at any time of the day or night. When you see a green light, please yield to the right and let the vehicle pass. The faster firefighters get to their stations, the faster they can get the fire trucks responding to the emergency scene. Remember, when you see a green light, move to the right!

ALARM ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

In November of 2023, the Niagara-on-the-Lake Fire and Emergency Services Community Risk Reduction (CRR) Division launched the Alarm Assistance Program (AAP). This free, ongoing program is intended to assist Niagara-onthe-Lake homeowners aged 65 and over and anyone with a disability or limited mobility with smoke and carbon monoxide alarm safety in their homes. Since November 2023, CRR members have visited and assisted over 50 homeowners and encourage homeowners requiring assistance with their alarms to sign up for a visit.

SMOKE & CARBON MONOXIDE ALARMS EXPIRE

Many people don't realize that smoke and carbon monoxide (CO) alarms expire! Most smoke and smoke/CO combination alarms last 10 years, while stand-alone CO alarms expire in 5-7 years, depending on the brand. Check the manufacturer or expiration date on the back or side of your alarm. If you can't find it and the alarm seems old, replace it. An expired alarm may not work properly, putting you at risk. Check yours today; it could save your life!











FIRE & EMERGENCY SERVICES

SMOKE & CARBON MONOXIDE ALARM MAINTENANCE

In Ontario, working smoke alarms are required by law on every level of your home, outside sleeping areas. Carbon monoxide alarms are required on every level of your home that has a bedroom or where someone sleeps, outside of sleeping areas. Have a look at the maintenance tips below to make sure your home is protected.

- Confirm that none of your alarms are expired by looking at the date on the back or side of the device. If an alarm is expired, replace it!
- Make sure your alarms function properly by pressing the "Test" button on all of them at least once a month.
- Familiarize yourself with the alarms' sounds and signals by referring to the manufacturer's instructions, checking the information on the back of the device, or listening to the different alarm sounds when you test the device.
- Change the batteries in every alarm at least twice a year.
- If your alarms are hardwired, replace the battery backups in every alarm at least twice a year to ensure operation during power outages.
- Keep your smoke alarms clean by gently vacuuming them to ensure they can accurately sense smoke.



Taking these precautions can make a significant difference in your safety and the safety of your loved ones. If you are unable to check and test your alarms yourself, please see the **Alarm Assistance Program** on Page 13 for more information.



OPEN-AIR BURNING & BACKYARD CAMPFIRES

In Niagara-on-the-Lake, open-air burns are only permitted for farmers to burn off their agricultural waste in rural areas of town who have applied for permission annually on the Town's website and are following the provided guidelines. Open-air burning is not permitted in urban areas of town. Burning garbage or construction waste is not permitted at any time and is subject to cost recovery fees for the Fire Department's response. Residents with yard waste are encouraged to bundle their yard waste and place it at the road for disposal with their household waste and recycling free of charge. Niagara-on-the-Lake residents who wish to have a backyard fire are encouraged to purchase a listed, natural gas or propane fire pit or table as these devices do not give off the undesirable smoke and embers that a wood-burning fire pit produces.

Niagara Lake FLOODING PREVENTION

Significant rainfall can lead to extensive flooding, impacting municipal infrastructure, private residences, and public properties. Niagara-on-the-Lake residents may experience unexpected surges in water levels during heavy rainfall due to several factors, including blocked waterways, dry ground, changes to the natural drainage pathways, overflowing storm drains, etc.



PRE-RAINFALL PREPARATIONS

TOWN STAFF'S ACTION

- Clear catch basins, inlets, and culverts.
- 2 Inspect storm ponds.
- Conduct ditching operations to ensure effective water flow.

HERE IS HOW YOU CAN HELP

- Regularly clear debris from catch basins, gutters, and downspouts.
- 2 Ensure that sump pumps are functioning correctly.
- Have an emergency plan in place.



DURING EXTREME RAINFALL

TOWN STAFF'S ACTION

- Check and clear problem areas.
- 2 Erect signage and close roads as necessary for public safety.
- Monitor and assess areas while waiting for water levels to lower.

HERE IS HOW YOU CAN HELP

- Ensure water is flowing away from your property.
- Drive safely and avoid flooded areas.
- Keep an eye on weather updates and advisories.



POST-STORM ACTIONS

TOWN STAFF'S ACTION

- Repair roads and eroded shoulders, remove debris from ditches, catch basins and culverts as needed.
- Communicate with residents who have submitted Service Requests related to flooding.

HERE IS HOW YOU CAN HELP

- Clear debris to restore water flow.
- Submit a Service Request to the Town to report issues or concerns regarding flooding and property drainage.

SUBMIT A SERVICE REQUEST

The Town encourages residents who experience flooding-related issues to submit an online Service Request. To submit a request, scan the QR code or visit www.notl.com/request-service-or-file-issue.



<u>î</u>IÎ GARBAGE & RECYCLING

Effective January 1, 2024, Circular Materials took over the delivery of residential blue/grey box recycling collection service that was administered by Niagara Region.



Quick Facts:

- Curbside recycling collection services will remain unchanged until December 31, 2025, except for books, which will no longer be accepted. There will be no change to the collection day or frequency (weekly).
- Niagara Region will continue to manage residential curbside garbage collection, including large household items, organics (green bin), and leaf and vard waste.
- The new Blue Box regulation does not cover industrial, commercial, and some institutional (IC&I) establishments, so Niagara Region will continue providing blue and grey box recycling collection services until December 31, 2025.
- Never forget your collection day again! Download the Niagara Region Waste app to get notifications to your phone for collection day reminders and service disruptions.

Where can I buy/replace my blue/grey bins?

Residents can contact Miller Waste Systems, Niagara-on-the-Lake's collection contractor, to order blue/grey bins. Miller Waste Systems will deliver them directly to your home!

- Residents can continue picking up green bins only at Town Hall (1593 Four Mile Creek Road, Virgil). Business owners
 who show a receipt of bins purchased from the Niagara Region can pick up blue/grey and green bins at Town Hall.

HERITAGE PLANNING

The Town of Niagara-on-the-Lake is proud to celebrate and preserve its rich cultural heritage, which plays a vital role in defining our community's identity. To conserve this heritage, the Town has a Heritage Permit system in place. This system ensures that any proposed alterations to designated heritage properties conserve and enhance the cultural heritage value of these significant sites.



The Town's municipal heritage register includes 429 properties, consisting of:

- Part IV designated properties (individually designated under the Ontario Heritage Act).
- Part V designated properties (located within the Heritage Conservation District).
- · Listed properties that are recognized for their heritage value but not formally designated.

In 2023, the Town launched its Priority Heritage Designation Program with 200 listed properties.

The Town has identified priority properties for designation. These properties were selected because they represent significant pieces of Niagara-on-the-Lake's history or identity. The priority properties were identified as those which, if lost due to demolition, neglect, or inappropriate alteration, would result in the substantial loss of a piece of Niagara-on-the-Lake history or identity. Progress continues on evaluating and designating properties on the priority lists.

QUEEN-PICTON (OLD TOWN) HERITAGE CONSERVATION DISTRICT STUDY

This initiative, in alignment with Council's Strategic Plan, is dedicated to preserving the unique charm and historical significance of Old Town through detailed research, public engagement, and expert guidance. From local historians to passionate volunteers, this project is powered by those who care deeply about NOTL's rich history.

By documenting the Town's historical assets, Council and Staff are working to ensure future generations can appreciate the beauty and history of the Town's iconic streetscapes.

The Study is currently in Phase One, and will involve opportunities for public engagement. Council considered the adoption of a Study Area By-law identifying an area of Old Town to be evaluated for potential expansion of the heritage conservation district currently bounded by Prideaux, Wellington, Johnson and Gate Streets surrounding the commercial core of Old Town. If passed, this By-law would place a temporary one-year restriction on alterations to property within the Study Area, with exemptions for minor alterations, while the Study is underway.


Time-of-use (TOU) is the **default** price plan for residential accounts. There are three TOU price periods: On-peak, Mid-peak, and Off-peak. TOU price period times change twice a year in summer (May 1 to October 31) and in winter (November 1 to April 30).

The electricity you use from 7 p.m. to 7 a.m. every day, and all day on weekends and holidays, is the lowest TOU price all year round. With TOU pricing, you can help manage your electricity costs by shifting your usage to lower price periods when possible.

Under Tiered Pricing, you can use a certain amount of electricity each month at a lower price. Once that limit (threshold) is exceeded, a higher price applies.

The monthly Tier threshold for residential customers changes twice a year: 600 kWh during the summer period (May 1 to October 31); 1,000 kWh during the winter period (November 1 to April 30).

If you typically use less than 600 kWh per month in the summer months, or less than 1,000 kWh in Winter months, then you might save the most on Tiered Price Plan. As a bonus, you won't need to adjust your habits such as doing laundry at night.




With the Ultra-Low Overnight (ULO) price plan, there are four price periods: On-peak, Mid-peak, Weekend Off-peak, and Ultra-Low Overnight.

The Ultra-Low Overnight period is between 11:00 p.m. to 7:00 a.m. every day, when demand for electricity is lowest on average. There is a higher On-peak price for consumption between 4:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. on weekdays, when demand is usually higher.

The ULO price periods are the same all year round. You can help manage your electricity costs by shifting high usage activities, like electric vehicle charging, to lower price periods when possible.

LICENCES & PERMITS

BUILDING

Are you planning to install a swimming pool or hot tub? Please remember to apply for and obtain a permit before installing an inground or above-ground pool or hot tub. Our convenient online building permit application service is available through Cloudpermit at www.ca.cloudpermit.com/login.

A building permit is also required for the following construction activities:

- · Buildings greater than 10 metres squared
- Decks greater than 600 millimetres above grade
- Sheds greater than 15 metres squared
- Demolition of existing structures
- Additions to existing buildings
- Interior renovations involving structural and/or plumbing modifications
- Finished basements
- Damp-proofing basements
- Changing the use of a building (including secondary dwelling units)
- Replacing water, storm, or sanitary sewer lines

DOGS

Niagara-on-the-Lake dog owners are required to register and vaccinate their dogs against rabies. Dog licenses are valid for a full 365 days after the date of purchase. Residents must obtain a current year's license within 14 days of acquiring or moving a dog into Niagara-on-the-Lake. Registration includes a unique license tag, which serves as an official license and offers the HomeSafe™ 24/7 lost pet service. Dog owners can purchase a license online at www.notl.docupet.com.

EVENTS

A Special Event is an event which may occupy all or part of Town owned property or may result in the disruption of the local flow of traffic. A special event may be defined as, but not limited to, a parade, festival, filming, race, procession, and/or any other activity that may include the following component(s): street closure(s), fireworks or pyrotechnics, live entertainment, temporary structures/tents, service of food or alcohol, large volumes of vehicular or pedestrian traffic.

In order to hold a Special Event within the Town, please complete and submit a Special Event Application Form found at www.notl.com/recreation-events/special-events. For more information on events, please email specialevents@notl.com or call 905-468-3266.

As of January 1, 2025, a \$100 application fee applies to all Special Event Permits to support administrative processing costs. A comprehensive review of the Special Events program is underway, with recommendations expected later in 2025.

HERITAGE

A Heritage Permit is required when the owner of a designated property wants to alter the exterior of a building designated under Part V or the designated portions of a building designated under Part IV of the *Ontario Heritage Act*. PLANNING TO DIG?

Building a fence, putting in a pool, planting a tree, or completing any other small digging project? Request a locate from Ontario One Call if you plan to dig in your yard. SHORT TERM RENTAL

In the Town of Niagara-on-the-Lake, a license is required to operate a Short Term Rental including a Bed & Breakfast, Cottage Rental, Country Inn, Villa or Vacation Apartment. A renewal application must be submitted every four years to maintain an active license, which includes a re-inspection of the Short Term Rental. This ensures that the Short Term Rental continues to meet the safety standards set forth by the Ontario Fire Code and the Town of Niagara-on-the-Lake By-laws.

The Town's By-law Enforcement Officers work in partnership with the Short Term Rental compliance program, Granicus, to provide support to the community. Residents can use an online reporting system to submit concerns regarding Short Term Rentals. They can also contact Granicus and speak to a Host Compliance Operator, available 24 hours a day, seven days a week, by calling 289-210-7226.

TREES

A permit may be required if you are planning to remove a tree from your property. Property owners are required to apply for a Tree Removal Permit before removing any tree with a trunk measuring 12.5 cm or larger in diameter. RESIDENT PARKING PERMITS

Resident Parking Permits are available exclusively to residents of Niagara-on-the-Lake. Permit holders can park in any metered parking space or lot in the Heritage District for up to three hours at one time. It's perfect for visiting Old Town to shop, dine, or catch a show! The permits cost \$30.00 and can be purchased online at www.notl.com or by visiting the Town of Niagara-on-the-Lake Administration Building at 1593 Four Mile Creek Road in Virgil. Valid identification is required as proof of address to obtain a permit. Permits are valid for the vehicle identified by license plate number and are nontransferable. They are valid from January 1 to December 31 of each calendar year.

ACCESSIBLE PARKING

Accessible parking spaces are located throughout the Town on the street and in municipal parking lots. All vehicles parking in an accessible zone must display a valid Accessible Parking Permit on their dashboard and are not required to pay for parking. The fine for parking in an accessible space without a valid permit displayed is \$400.00.

PARKING REMINDERS

- Please do not block driveways or sidewalks.
- Pay close attention to posted signs limiting or restricting parking.
- Parking your vehicle within 10 metres of an intersection or 3 meters of a fire hydrant is not allowed.
- You may not park in one spot for longer than 12 hours at one time.
- Always park your vehicle in the same direction as the traffic flow.


Property taxes in Niagara-on-the-Lake fund essential services like road maintenance. Town parks, fire and emergency services, community programs, and more.

The Town issues tax bills twice a year: the Interim Tax Bill in February and the Final Tax Bill in July, each payable in two installments. Payment options include pre-authorized payments, online banking, credit card payments (via Paymentus, with fees), and in-person at Town Hall (1593 Four Mile Creek Road) or by mail. Residents can also opt for e-billing (eSend) for digital statements.

WATER & WASTEWATER

The Town of Niagara-on-the-Lake owns and operates two separate drinking water distribution systems which are the Niagara-on-the-Lake drinking water system (Niagara-on-the-Lake DWS) and the Bevan Heights drinking water system (Bevan Heights DWS). The Town maintains responsibility for water distribution only; the facilities for water treatment and storage are owned and managed by the Niagara Region. The two drinking water systems distribute treated drinking water within a service area of approximately 12,600 hectares. The service area is bounded by Lake Ontario, the Niagara River, the City of Niagara Falls and the City of St. Catharines.

SAMPLE STATIONS

Curious what those green objects are that stand alone and look like green parking meters? They are water sample stations! These stations allow the Town to test the quality of the water we drink, as they provide a direct line to the watermain. These stations enhance the Town's ability to test a wider area of the Town's water supply. With 15 stations already within the system, the Town can help ensure the water residents are drinking meets and exceeds Ministry Legislation where possible. The water system that the Town has is one of the best in the country and with the wider array of testing, Staff can stay on top of any issues that may arise.
