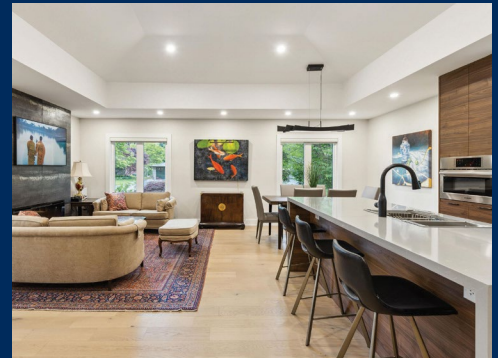

CLIMATE CHANGE

The Climate Change Coordinator leads climate action in Niagara-on-the-Lake by implementing the Climate Change Adaptation Plan and embedding climate considerations into municipal policies, projects, and operations. This role supports key environmental priorities from both the Adaptation and Strategic Plans, including developing plans, reviewing policies and development applications for climate resilience, pursuing and securing funding, leading adaptation and mitigation projects, and engaging the community. The Coordinator also works with regional and provincial partners to align local efforts with broader strategies, advancing a sustainable and resilient future that reflects Council priorities and community values.

Climate Change Adaptation Plan & Strategic Plan

The impacts of climate change are already being felt across our region and will only intensify in the years to come. To ensure our community is prepared and resilient, the Town took a transformative step forward in 2022 with the creation of its Climate Change Adaptation Plan. This plan outlines 27 impactful actions across six key goals designed to address extreme weather and minimize climate impacts. These goals, ranging from incorporating climate change in design and construction, to reducing flooding risks, and enhancing public awareness, will help us manage risks, seize opportunities, and safeguard our future. As municipalities are on the frontlines in climate change adaptation, the Town is committed to protecting its community and infrastructure. DEVELOPMENT & PLANNING

What is planning?

Land use planning in Niagara-on-the-Lake plays an important role in shaping the community. The purpose of land use planning is to manage land and resources to create a safe, healthy and inviting place to live, work and play. Some of the components that planning considers are:

- How residents travel to where they need to go;
- How residents can access their homes;
- Where people can gather with family, friends and neighbours; and,
- Where houses, businesses and parks should be located to make the Town accessible.

Who sets the rules?

In Ontario, the Province, Niagara Region and local municipalities work together. The Province sets the ground rules and directions for planning, through the *Planning Act* and the Provincial Planning Statement (PPS). These rules help protect the environment and make sure the Town is growing appropriately. In Niagara-on-the-Lake, area-specific provincial plans, including the Greenbelt Plan and Niagara Escarpment Plan, work together with the PPS.

The Town is responsible for implementing the provincial land use planning policy framework through the Town's Official Plan, including the Niagara Official Plan, and Zoning By-law. Through Council and/or the Committee of Adjustment, the Town is also responsible for making land use planning decisions to achieve the community's economic, social, and environmental objectives. Municipal decisions on development applications must be consistent with the PPS and conform to provincial plans, allowing for municipalities to be given some flexibility in deciding how to best achieve provincial policy direction.

How can community members get involved?

Community members input on development applications is an important part of the planning process. Town Staff encourage public comment on planning matters, and all comments received are considered in the review of development applications. Community members can get involved with development applications in a few ways: through attending Open Houses to learn more about the proposal, speaking about a proposal during a Public Meeting or Committee of Adjustment Hearing, and/or providing written comments. Public notices, opportunities to provide input, and information on current development applications and appeals can be found on the Town's website at www.notl.com/business-development. Official Plan Review

The Town has developed a work plan for the completion of a new Niagara-on-the-Lake Official Plan by the end of 2025, which builds upon work completed in 2019, and will incorporate the Niagara Official Plan while addressing changes in provincial planning legislation, such as the new Provincial Planning Statement. Public open houses will provide the opportunity for the public to learn about the Official Plan and seek input on the review. An updated draft Official Plan was released in the summer for public consultation. Public open houses will follow in September, with the goal to adopt the Official Plan by the end of 2025.

FIRE & EMERGENCY SERVICES

The Niagara-on-the-Lake Fire & Emergency Services Department is a volunteer organization made up of 100 firefighters and 10 Volunteer Public Educators who work together to create an efficient and high-quality emergency service. With a dedication to prevention, education, and emergency response, Niagara-on-the-Lake Fire & Emergency Services' goal is to be high-performing, progressive, and visionary in the provision of emergency services within the community.



GREEN LIGHT AWARENESS

See a green light? Move to the right!

Keep an eye out for the green light when driving in Niagara-on-the-Lake. When volunteer firefighters respond to an emergency, they first drive their personal vehicles to their respective fire stations before they can respond to the emergency in the fire trucks that we're all familiar with. A green light may appear in any type of vehicle at any time of the day or night. When you see a green light, please yield to the right and let the vehicle pass. The faster firefighters get to their stations, the faster they can get the fire trucks responding to the emergency scene.

SMOKE & CARBON MONOXIDE ALARMS EXPIRE

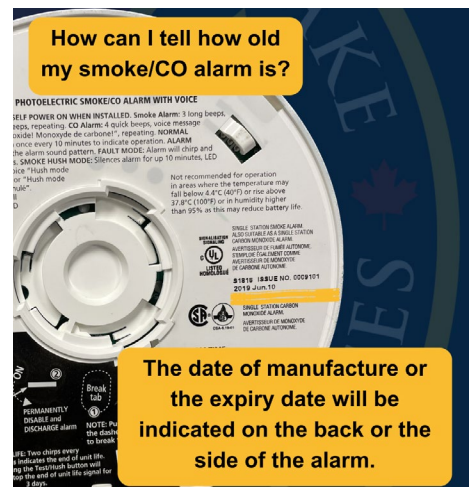
Many people don't realize that smoke and carbon monoxide (CO) alarms expire. Most smoke and smoke/CO combination alarms last 10 years, while stand-alone CO alarms expire in five to seven years, depending on the brand. Check the manufacturer or expiration date on the back or side of your alarm. If you can't find it and the alarm seems old, replace it. An expired alarm may not work properly, putting you at risk. Check yours today; it could save your life!

SMOKE & CARBON MONOXIDE ALARM MAINTENANCE

In Ontario, working smoke alarms are required by law on every level of your home, outside sleeping areas. Carbon monoxide alarms are required on every level of your home that has a bedroom or where someone sleeps, outside of sleeping areas. Have a look at the tips below to make sure your home is protected.

- Confirm that your alarms have not expired by looking at the date on the back or side of the device. If an alarm is expired, replace it.
- Make sure your alarms function properly by pressing the "Test" button at least once a month.
- Familiarize yourself with the alarms' sounds and signals by referring to the manufacturer's instructions, checking the information on the back of the device, or listening to the different alarm sounds when you test the device.
- Change the batteries in every alarm at least twice a year.
- If your alarms are hardwired, replace the battery backups in every alarm at least twice a year to ensure operation during power outages.
- Keep your smoke alarms clean by gently vacuuming them to ensure they can accurately sense smoke.

FIRE & EMERGENCY SERVICES

FURNACE SAFETY

As the temperature drops, it's just about time to start our home furnaces back up for the season. Natural gas-powered furnaces are the most common type of home furnace, which can come with some safety risks if they are not maintained properly.

Please keep these tips in mind when turning your heat on this season:

- Schedule an annual cleaning and tune-up by a licensed technician before you turn on your furnace for the first time this year. Your furnace can emit carbon monoxide if it is not properly maintained.
- Change the air filter regularly as dust and debris can build up creating a fire hazard.
- Don't store anything combustible near your furnace to help avoid and contain furnace fires.
- Make sure that you have a working carbon monoxide detector in your home.

FIREPLACE & SPACE HEATER SAFETY

If you have a wood-burning fireplace, have your chimney inspected annually and cleaned (if needed) by a licensed technician. Keep a fire extinguisher nearby, as just one spark can start a fire. Gas fireplaces should also be inspected annually, and turned off when you leave the room. Never leave wood-burning fireplaces or space heaters unattended, keep heaters away from anything combustible, and follow manufacturer instructions for safe use.

LITHIUM-ION BATTERY SAFETY

Lithium-ion battery fires are on the rise worldwide due to the increased use of batteries in everyday devices like phones, tablets, laptops, headphones, toys, and power or lawn equipment. If damaged or improperly used, these batteries can overheat, catch fire, or even explode. Knowing which devices in your home contain lithium-ion batteries and ensuring they have proper safety certifications is essential, as some products sold in stores or online may not meet safety standards, increasing fire risk.



When charging a device, it is important to ensure:

- Always use the cables that came with the product to charge it and follow the instructions from the manufacturer.
- If you need a new charger, buy one from the manufacturer or one that the manufacturer has approved.
- Charge your device on a hard surface. Don't charge it under a pillow, on a bed, or on a couch, as this could cause a fire.
- Don't overcharge your device. Unplug it or remove the battery when it's fully charged.

Recycling Batteries

- Don't throw lithium-ion batteries in the trash or regular recycling bins because they could catch fire.
 - Recycling your device or battery at a safe battery recycling location is the best way to dispose of them.
- Visit www.call2recycle.org to find a recycling spot near you.

GARBAGE & RECYCLING

The Niagara Region manages residential curbside garbage collection, including large household items, organics (green bin), and leaf and yard waste. Circular Materials manages residential blue/grey box recycling.

Download the Niagara Region Waste App to:

- View your address specific calendar, including holiday changes to waste collection.
- Use the search tool to find out how to properly dispose of your recyclables, organics and garbage.
- Report illegal dumping.
- Schedule a large item collection.
- Sign up for collection reminders.

HERITAGE PLANNING

The Town of Niagara-on-the-Lake is proud to celebrate and preserve its rich cultural heritage, which plays a vital role in defining the community's identity. To conserve this heritage, the Town has a Heritage Permit system in place. This system ensures that any proposed alterations to designated heritage properties conserve and enhance the cultural heritage value of these significant sites.

The Town's municipal heritage register includes 429 properties, consisting of:

- Part IV designated properties (individually designated under the *Ontario Heritage Act*).
- Part V designated properties (located within the Heritage Conservation District).
- Listed properties that are recognized for their heritage value but not formally designated.

In 2023, the Town launched its Priority Heritage Designation Program with 200 listed properties.

The Town has identified priority properties for designation. These properties were selected because they represent significant pieces of Niagara-on-the-Lake's history or identity. The priority properties were identified as those which, if lost due to demolition, neglect, or inappropriate alteration, would result in the substantial loss of a piece of Niagara-on-the-Lake history or identity. Progress continues on evaluating and designating properties on the priority lists.

QUEEN-PICTON (OLD TOWN) HERITAGE CONSERVATION DISTRICT STUDY

This initiative, in alignment with Council's Strategic Plan, is dedicated to preserving the unique charm and historical significance of Old Town through detailed research, public engagement, and expert guidance. From local historians to passionate volunteers, this project is powered by those who care deeply about Niagara-on-the-Lake's rich history. By documenting the Town's historical assets, Council and Staff are working to ensure future generations can appreciate the beauty and history of the Town's iconic streetscapes.

The Phase One of the Study was approved by Council in June 2025, and Council directed Staff to begin Phase 2 which involves further opportunities for public engagement. Additionally, Council has also adopted a Study Area By-law identifying an area of Old Town to be evaluated for expansion of the heritage conservation district currently bounded by Prideaux, Wellington, Johnson and Gate Streets surrounding the commercial core of Old Town. This By-law places a temporary one-year restriction on alterations to property within the Study Area, with exemptions for minor alterations, while the Study is underway, which expires in February 2026. The by-law was amended in June to reduce the boundaries of the study area to match the recommended expanded Heritage Conservation District boundary endorsed by Council at the end of Phase 1.

KNOW YOUR RATE OPTIONS

As a residential customer, you have 3 Regulated Price Plans (RPP) to choose from. The following is an overview of your RPP options as of Fall 2025.

TOU

TIME-OF-USE

7,435 Residential Accounts

Time-of-use (TOU) is the **default** price plan for residential accounts. There are three TOU price periods: On-peak, Mid-peak, and Off-peak. TOU price period times change twice a year in summer (May 1 to October 31) and in winter (November 1 to April 30).

The electricity you use from 7 p.m. to 7 a.m. every day, and all day on weekends and holidays, is the lowest TOU price all year round. With TOU pricing, you can help manage your electricity costs by shifting your usage to lower price periods when possible.

TIERED

TIERED RATES

1,004 Residential Accounts

Under Tiered Pricing, you can use a certain amount of electricity each month at a lower price. Once that limit (threshold) is exceeded, a higher price applies.

The monthly Tier threshold for residential customers changes twice a year: 600 kWh during the summer period (May 1 to October 31); 1,000 kWh during the winter period (November 1 to April 30).

If you typically use less than 600 kWh per month in the summer (May - Oct), or less than 1,000 kWh in Winter months (Nov - Apr), then you might save the most on Tiered Price Plan. You won't need to adjust your habits such as doing laundry at night.

ULO

ULTRA-LOW OVERNIGHT

35 Residential Accounts

With the Ultra-Low Overnight (ULO) price plan, there are four price periods: On-peak, Mid-peak, Weekend Off-peak, and Ultra-Low Overnight.

The Ultra-Low Overnight period is between 11:00 p.m. to 7:00 a.m. every day, when demand for electricity is lowest on average. There is a higher On-peak price for consumption between 4:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. on weekdays, when demand is usually higher.

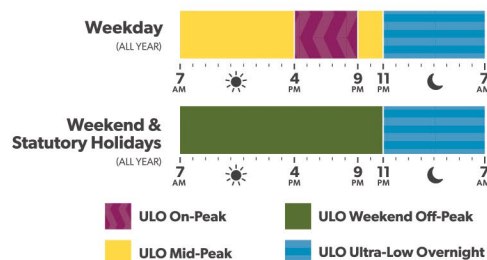
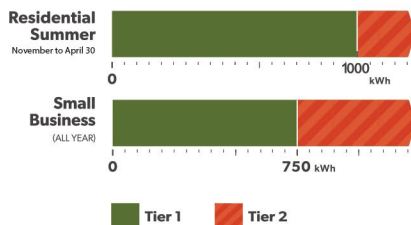
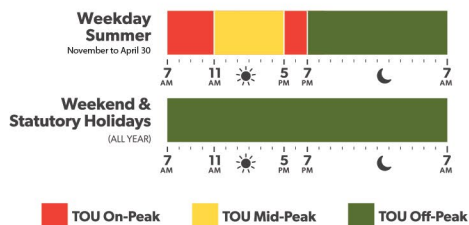
The ULO price periods are the same all year round. You can help manage your electricity costs by shifting high usage activities, like electric vehicle charging, to lower price periods when possible.

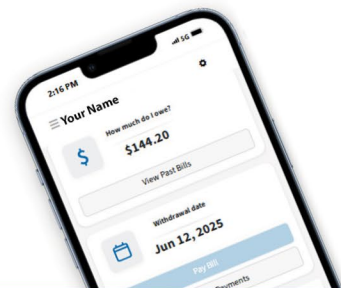

LICENCES & PERMITS

BUILDING

A building permit is required for the following construction activities:

- Buildings greater than 10 metres squared
- Decks greater than 600 millimetres above grade
- Sheds greater than 15 metres squared
- Demolition of existing structures
- Additions to existing buildings
- Interior renovations involving structural and/or plumbing modifications
- Finished basements
- Damp-proofing basements
- Changing the use of a building (including secondary dwelling units)
- Replacing water, storm, or sanitary sewer lines

DOGS

We love dogs in Niagara-on-the-lake!

Niagara-on-the-Lake dog owners are required to register and vaccinate their dogs against rabies. Dog licenses are valid for a full 365 days after the date of purchase. Residents must obtain a current year's license within 14 days of acquiring or moving a dog into Niagara-on-the-Lake. Registration includes a unique license tag, which serves as an official license and offers the HomeSafe™ 24/7 lost pet service. Dog owners can purchase a license online at www.notl.docupet.com.

EVENTS

Please note: The information provided is subject to change based on the review of Special Events in Niagara-on-the-Lake. For current and accurate details regarding special events in Niagara-on-the-Lake, please visit www.notl.com/recreation-events/special-events.

A Special Event is defined as any organized activity that may occupy all or part of Town-owned property and/or result in a disruption to normal traffic flow within the municipality. Special Events include, but are not limited to, parades, festivals, races, processions, film productions, and other public gatherings. These events may involve one or more of the following elements:

- Road or street closures
- Fireworks or pyrotechnic displays
- Live entertainment or amplified sound

PUBLIC SERVICES

- Installation of temporary structures (e.g., tents, stages)
- Service or sale of food and/or alcoholic beverages
- Significant increases in pedestrian and/or vehicular traffic

To host a Special Event within the Town of Niagara-on-the-Lake, organizers are required to complete and submit a Special Event Application Form available at www.notl.com/recreation-events/special-events. For more information, please call 905-468-3266 or email specialevents@notl.com.

Application Fee: An application fee of \$100 is required for all Special Event Application submissions to support administrative processing costs. Organizations that provide a valid charitable registration number at the time of application will be exempt from the application fee, in accordance with the Council motion approved on February 25, 2025.

HERITAGE

A Heritage Permit is required when the owner of a designated property wants to alter the exterior of a building designated under Part V or the designated portions of a building designated under Part IV of the *Ontario Heritage Act*. PLANNING TO DIG?

Building a fence, putting in a pool, planting a tree, or completing any other small digging project? Request a locate from Ontario One Call if you plan to dig in your yard. It is important to contact Ontario One Call so you can dig safely. Please visit www.ontarioonecall.ca or call 1-800-400-2255 before you dig.

SHORT TERM RENTAL

In the Town of Niagara-on-the-Lake, a license is required to operate a Short Term Rental (STR) (28 days or less) including a Bed & Breakfast, Cottage Rental, Country Inn, Villa or Vacation Apartment. A renewal application must be submitted every four years to maintain an active license, which includes an application fee and a re-inspection of the STR. This ensures that the STR continues to meet the safety standards set forth by the Ontario Fire Code and the Town of Niagara-on-the-Lake by-laws.

The Town's By-law Enforcement Officers work in partnership with the Short Term Rental compliance program, Granicus, to provide support to the community. Residents can use an online reporting system to submit concerns regarding STRs. They can also contact Granicus and speak to a Host Compliance Operator, available 24 hours a day, seven days a week, by calling 289-210-7226. TREES

A Tree Removal Permit may be required if you are planning to remove a tree from your property. Property owners must apply for a permit before removing any tree with a trunk diameter of 12.5 cm or greater. In addition, all trees, including those on Town property, must be protected during any construction or landscaping work. Damage to trees, whether accidental or intentional, may result in enforcement actions and fines under Town by-laws. If you are unsure about tree ownership, please contact the Town before beginning any work. Taking the time to confirm these details helps prevent violations and ensures our community's green infrastructure is preserved for future generations.

RESIDENT PARKING PERMITS

Resident Parking Permits are available exclusively to residents of Niagara-on-the-Lake. Permit holders can park in any metered parking space or lot in the Heritage District (Old Town) for up to three hours at one time. It's perfect for visiting Old Town to shop, dine, or catch a show! The permits cost \$30.00 and can be purchased online at www.notl.com/town-services/parking or by visiting the Town Hall at 1593 Four Mile Creek Road in Virgil. Valid identification is required as proof of address to obtain a permit. Permits are valid for the vehicle identified by license plate number and are nontransferable. They are valid from January 1 to December 31 of each calendar year.

ACCESSIBLE PARKING

Accessible parking spaces are located throughout Town on the street and in municipal parking lots. All vehicles parking in an accessible zone must display a valid Accessible Parking Permit on their dashboard and are not required to pay for parking. The fine for parking in an accessible space without a valid permit displayed is \$400.00.

PARKING REMINDERS

- Please do not block driveways or sidewalks.
- Pay close attention to posted signs limiting or restricting parking.
- Parking your vehicle within 10 metres of an intersection or 3 meters of a fire hydrant is not allowed.
- You may not park in one spot for longer than 12 hours at one time.
- Always park your vehicle in the same direction as the traffic flow.

PROPERTY TAX

Property taxes in Niagara-on-the-Lake fund essential services like road maintenance, parks, fire and emergency services, community programs, and more.

The Town issues tax bills twice a year: the Interim Tax Bill in February and the Final Tax Bill in July, each payable in two installments. Payment options include pre-authorized payments, online banking, credit card payments (via Paymentus, with fees), and in-person at Town Hall (1593 Four Mile Creek Road) or by mail. Residents can also sign up for e-billing (eSend) for digital statements.

WATER & WASTEWATER



The Town is proud to have a dedicated team of Water Division Staff who are responsible for maintaining over 202 km of water mains, 1,383 valves, and 21 sampling stations across all five villages.

Each week, the Team collects and analyzes an average of 30 water samples from various locations to ensure drinking water meets the highest safety and quality standards.

Staff are legally certified, and undergo continuous training, both in the classroom and on the job. This past year, the Team introduced directional water main flushing, a proactive technique that helps maintain water clarity and quality throughout the system.

Fun Fact: Niagara Region has been awarded the title of Best Tasting Tap Water in Ontario for the past two years!

Our team takes great pride in their work and in serving the community. If you see them out and about, don't hesitate to say hello or ask them about your water; they'd be happy to share their knowledge with you.

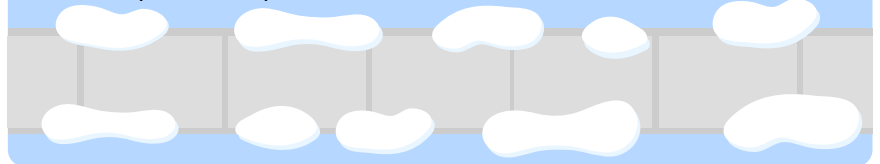
Did you know?

Municipal roads in Niagara-on-the-Lake make up a total of **255.95 kilometres**. Just two passes with the snow plow is the equivalent of driving from Niagara-on-the-Lake to Sudbury!



Sidewalks

The Town of Niagara-on-the-Lake is responsible for clearing snow from a total of **78.16 kilometres** of municipal sidewalks. Sidewalks are plowed after the storm has subsided, roads have been plowed, and a minimum of 75 mm (3 inches) of snow has fallen at one time.



Parking

Please refrain from parking on the street before, during or after a winter storm event to allow for proper plow truck operations. Parking tickets may be issued to vehicles in contravention of By-law 4308-09.



It's important to watch out for our slow plows when their lights are flashing and they are spreading out materials.

Did you know?

"Why not keep the plow down at all times?" If you see a snow plow with its plow up on a road that hasn't been cleared, remember each truck is assigned to a specific route. The truck may be traveling to the beginning of a route to begin a sanding operation that is completed before plowing.

Snow Placement

Kindly pile all snow from your driveway and walkways on your property, not the road. When clearing your driveway, pile snow on the right side if you are facing the street. This will help reduce the snow pushed back into your driveway by a snow plow.



Reminder:

In an **emergency** situation, you should always call **911** to access emergency services. If snow or ice is blocking access for emergency vehicles, emergency services will coordinate directly with the Town to clear the route or find the fastest alternative way to reach you.
